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
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
PREFACE

Dr.N.G.P. Arts and Science College was established 1997 under the aegis of Kovai Medical Center Research and Educational Trust (established in the year 1990) with **Dr. Nalla G. This co-educational self-financing College was started with a motto "Nurture, Grow and Prosper". The Dr. N.G.P. Arts and Science College has received approval from the Government of Tamilnadu in 1997, (G.O. M.S. No. 464, dt. 27/08/1997) and is affiliated to Bharathiar University, Coimbatore (Ref. No. 11129/A1/97 dt. 17/10/1997). Dr.N.G.P. Arts and Science College has been included under 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC act 1956. (Ref.No. Vide No. F. 8- 50/2004 (CPP/i) dt. June 2003)

The College was started with 4 Under Graduate Programmes with student strength of 78. At present the College offers 23 Under Graduate and 14 Post Graduate Programmes. 8 Departments have been recognized for M.Phil Degree programme and 5 Departments for research leading to Doctoral Degree. The College also offers 5 Post Graduate Diploma Programmes, 2 Diploma Programmes and 3 Certificate Programmes. At present the College has a student strength of 5092 and faculty strength of 244. Dr. N.G.P. Arts and Science College constantly endeavors to adopt new initiatives to upgrade its performance based on the recommendations of the previous NAAC peer team. - Lack of sufficient Patents and Copy Rights for the research work.





Orientation to new members of faculty and fresher students

Before the commencement of every academic year, orientation programme is scheduled to all the new staff in order to make them understand the Vision, Mission and the Primary Objectives of the institution and adapt themselves to the current environment. Orientation is offered to the first year students about their course and the college. This enables the students to acclimation themselves to the Institution.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) consolidates the action plans of all the departments and prepares an Academic Year Planner to facilitate the effective implementation of Curriculum. The strategies followed are:

Monitoring Curriculum Delivery

Before the commencement of each semester meticulous planning is made. Each teacher maintains a Log Book and a schedule for syllabus completion. Two Internal tests and a Model Examination are conducted during each semester as per the University Regulations.

The Log Book is monitored by the Head of the Department and audited. It enables them to carry out the task on time and assist in quality curriculum delivery. The time table of the department helps the Head of the Department to monitor the curriculum delivery of his / her department. Special attention and extra coaching classes are given to slow learners.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Support by the University

The University offers several refresher programmes for the faculty and exposes them to the changes in the curricula of different subjects through its UGC - Academic Staff College(now renamed as UGC - HRD Centre). The resolutions passed by the respectiveBoards of Studies in the University are circulated among the faculty of our college wherever there is a need. Some members of our own college faculty are also members and some chairpersons in University Boards of Studies. The university sends us advanced information about the deadlines for submission of examination applications of students and the schedule for conduct of the University examination for each semester.

Support by the Institution

The college has a well-stocked library and separate internet facility in each department. Besides 116 classrooms there are 6 seminar halls with seating capacity ranging from 100 to 1500. They are utilised to conduct department activities such as workshops, seminars, guest lectures and conferences.

The Institution extends on-duty leave and registration fee for faculty members who participate on invitation in various Faculty Development Programmes, Refresher Courses, Workshops, Seminars, Conferences and Symposia organized by other institutions. The Institution also organizes Faculty Development Programmes in its own campus by inviting external resource persons. In addition each department organizes programmes with external resource persons for its own faculty and students.

Awards and Recognitions

Any faculty member who produces 100 % result in the subject he / she handles is given a silver coin as a token of honour. If the same teacher produces 100 % result in more than one subject or in more than one class he / she is given as many silver coins.

Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options?

Credit Systemis followed as per Bharathiar University regulations, where weightage of credits are equally divided to all semesters and the Cumulative Grade Point Average is awarded based on the credits. The University offers three Elective Options for each course from which the College selects the choice that has more demand. A total of 140 credits are prescribed for UG and 90 credits for PG programmes.

Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)

All Undergraduate and Post graduate programmes are offered by the University under CBCS pattern. The Institution has been approved by the University to admit the students migrating from other University / College during their course of study.

- **60-60 Programme** This Programme is a unique feature comprising 60 boys and 60 girls. It helps the students to hone their communicative skills and inspires them to become eloquent public speakers.
- **Newsletter** All the departments record their activities and achievements by releasing newsletters every year.
- **Tamil Osai** Every year, the college publishes an exclusive Tamil Magazine, 'Tamil Osai', comprising Tamil articles, poems and short stories contributed by the students and staff irrespective of the department.
- Value-added Programmes- Value- added programmes are offered by the college in
 association with the reputed organizations like HCL, Max Value, ICA, and AOSTA
 and so on. These courses have strengthened the domain knowledge of the students and
 skill in the usage of technology.
- Language Lab It is a value- addition to the institution as it changes attitude of the students and staff language learning, they visit the lab regularly and make use of the grammar and spoken language modules available.
- NGP Fest In order to promote the talent of the students and to kindle the
 competitive spirit amidst them, the Fine Arts Committee of the college conducts
 Inter-Departmental Fest with a range of events. The winner of all the events is
 declared as the Over-all champion for that academic year.
- Exotica This is one of the most awaited happenings of the college as it draws together the talented students of all the colleges in and around Coimbatore. It is a South Zone Inter- Collegiate Cultural meet that serves as a platform for the budding talents to showcase their extracurricular skills. Exotica 2014 was held on

- 24.01.2014, wherein nearly 700 students from 55 colleges took part and won prizes worth Rs. 75,000.
- **Journal Club** Every Wednesday, the students of III UG, I PG, II PG and the Research Scholars are motivated to read articles from reputed journals and present it in the club meeting. This has fostered research.
- •Youngistan Club- An active Reader's Club inculcates the habit of reading in its members and allows them to present book reviews and share their opinions on a particular fiction, article, poem and short story. The Club meets at least once in a month with great enthusiasm and commitment.
- **Drama Club** It is a vibrant club of the college. It tunes the divergent skills of the students through acting, mono acting, miming, play writing, short-film making and directing. The club organizes competitions regularly and stimulates its members to participate in events conducted outside the college.
- Eco Club- Eco Club inculcates the knowledge on biodiversity for conservation of plants, wildlife, birds, water bodies and educates the youth on the health and hygienic practices to overcome dreadful diseases. It organizes health camps, special lectures and competitions inside and outside the college to create environmental awareness, promote, and monitor environmental activities.
- Women's Forum- With a view to empower women and also to give them adequate knowledge about the current issues regarding gender bias and health-related issues, the Women's Forum of the college invites eminent personalities to address the female students. The forum also acts as a platform for girls to voice out their grievances.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Dr. N.G.P. Arts and Science College has designed and has been offering bridge courses towards empowering the students especially from rural areas to integrate them with brighter students who have enrolled in various courses. The college offers a supplementary education programme for Associate Company Secretaryship (ACS) for B. Com. Students for preparing ACS entrance examination. International certification programmes like CCNA are also offered as value added course. The college has MoU with IIT Bombay for our students to access their E-Learning courses. IIT Bombay took this initiative for this MoU.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college organizes Employment Oriented Skill Development Programmes for the students with corporate trainers. Some of our faculties go to short term Faculty Development Programmes in frontier areas offered in other colleges and come back and train our own students.

The College responds to the momentous issues of our society.

- Activities related to these issues are conducted under the aegis of Center for Value Education and Center for Women Development.

Gender

Dr. N.G.P. Arts and Science College is making determined efforts for the empowerment of women and to eliminate gender disparities and discrimination.

• The Center for Women Development provides guidance and counseling for female students. The Center observes 'International Women's Day' and organizes lectures to

bring awareness among the women students about gender sensitivity, sexual harassment and women empowerment.

Climate Change

Students are taught about environmental issues and they are assisted in the field of environment preservation and protection.

- The awareness about environmental pollution and hygiene is educated to the students through lectures by experts in the camps organized by NSS.
- Lectures on Global Warming and Environmental Pollution are organized to spread awareness to all sections of society through Eco Club.

Environmental Education

Environmental Study is one of the subjects included in the University syllabus.

- Initiatives to protect the environment are undertaken by the Eco Club of the college. It plays an important role in creating environmental awareness among the younger generation.
- The club arranges activities like throw light to reduce global warming, awareness programmes on clean and green environment, tree plantation campaign and lectures by eminent environmentalists.

Human Rights

The college motivates the students to protect the values of human beings irrespective of gender, caste, religion, and nationality and community education based on human rights. It caters to the intellectual, psychological and social needs of the students.

- Student Welfare activities and Student Development Programmes have been initiated.
 These include grievance redressal systems, anti ragging committee, sexual harassment redressal committee.
- The College provides an academically sound and socially rewarding environment to students.

ICT

The College has state-of-the-art infrastructure for imparting computer training.

- ICT is included in the curriculum of PG and UG classes for all programmes. This foundation knowledge of computers and technology training make the students a part of global information system and enhances their employability.
- The Institution provides computer with internet connectivity to all departments.
- The Language Laboratory is used for the teaching of phonetics, Communicative English and to train students for potential jobs in the electronic media.

Moral and Ethical Values

- The college has promoted a Center for Value Education in January 2015 by which the students are motivated through special lectures by faculty of the college and external resource persons.
- The college conducts weekly assembly on every Friday under the leadership of the Principal. The Principal and faculty members address the students on moral and ethical values.
- Yoga and meditation programmes are arranged under the auspicious of Center for Value Education and National Service Scheme units of the College.
- Community Service programmes such as Blood Donation Camps, Blood Group Identification Camps, Visit to Old Age Homes and Schools for Blind are organized.

Employable and Life Skills

The Placement Cell of the college conducts Skill Development Programmes.

- The Placement Cell and the Department of English provide communicative classes for the students to channelize their communicative skills. Career counseling workshops are organized to orient the students.
- The Department of English offers various courses to sharpen the students' communicative skills. Value Added Course, UGC- Career Oriented Course, Business English Course facilitate the students mastery of English spoken and written. The department gives special attention to students from vernacular medium schools.
- Dr. N.G.P. Arts and Science College has a Language lab to promote speaking skills of students with emphasize on Received Pronunciation (pronunciation as per International Standards).
- Students are assigned different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars and workshops. In this way, they improve their team building and organizational skills.

Better Career Options

The college offers value added courses on recent trends for all the students to develop their skills and awareness for better career options.

Community Orientation

The National Service Scheme of the College organizes Blood Donation Camp, AIDS awareness, Drug abuse, Environmental awareness programs etc.

The NSS organizes seven days special camp in the villages and involve in social
activities. Each department instills social awareness among the students by organizing
awareness rallies on menace like dengue fever, drug abuse and women issues such as
cervical cancer, breast feeding.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The College has network with the stakeholders to collect and document responses on curriculum aspects.

We follow the curriculum dictated by the University. However the institution regularly collects feedback from the samples of stakeholder, analyzes them, documents them and files the report since 2011 – 12 onwards. It is circulated among all the faculty members with an advice to respond to and modify themselves accordingly.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

After the introduction of Autonomy a class committee consisting of mixed ability student groups is constituted by the Head of the Department for each class. The details of the committee are given to the different / another Head of the Department. This HoD interacts in confidence with the committee and documents the quality of the programme and submits it directly to the Dean of Academic Affairs.

In addition the Principal conducts class representative meeting every semester. During this meeting with representatives all aspects like infrastructure facilities, teaching etc can be raised by the student representatives. In the meeting of the Principal with Heads of the Departments quality monitoring and suggestions for remedial actions will be discussed.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Twenty one members of our faculty are members of the University Board of Studies and in the BOS of various autonomous college in their respective subjects .Being an Affiliated College we cannot bring changes directly to the curriculum. However, faculty members do sends suggestions to the Chairman of respective boards through the Principal of our college. Some suggestions emanate from the students also. These are critically examined and if found worthwhile forwarded to the Board of Studies. Similarly any shortcomings in the question papers of University Examinations are also sent to the Controller of Examinations, Bharathiar University, by the faculty. The Controller in turn will forward the same to the Chairman of the Board of Studies.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/ new programmes?

Yes. Such a formal system is instituted from the current academic year when the college has gained the autonomous status.

A feedback mechanism is followed to collect the response from the Alumni during Alumni meet. Exit Feedback is collected from the Outgoing Students. Parents' feedback is collected during Parent- Teacher Association meeting. The feedback from the current batch students is collected through the Students Academic Council. Industry feedback is taken while signing the MOUs. Feedback about the Alumni is obtained from their employers. The feedback through Academic Peer meeting are received and communicated to the University.

Introduction of New Programmes

As per Bharathiar University norms, a College Committee comprising the College Governing Council calls on discussion about introducing new programmes for the academic year and additional batches for the existing programmes. Decision taken by the College Governing Council is forwarded to the University for approval.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/ courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/ programmes?

Some of the courses are instituted as per the suggestion of the previous NAAC peer team. Some were instituted as the faculty felt there were job openings for graduate of such courses. Details of the programmes introduced are as follows.



CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1. How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Publicity for admission is carried out consistently through the college website under the URL www.drngpasc.ac.in

- The College prepares a prospectus every year with educational facts and is circulated among the students when they approach the college for admission. The Institution displays banners in prominent locations of the city highlighting the unique features of the Institute. The advertisements for admissions are made in leading newspapers in vernacular and regional languages.
- The college advertises about the UG, PG and Research Programmes stating the eligibility criteria for admission, facilities available and concessions offered.
- A separate admission committee is formed to facilitate the prosper admission of students for Under Graduate and Post Graduate programmes. The procedure adapted by the college for student admission scrupulously adheres to the rules and regulations prescribed by the affiliating University in this regard.
- The admission committee explains the parents and the students about the various programmes and facilities available. The students are given the opportunity to select the programme based on their interest and the eligibility criteria. After the admission process, each student is given an unique roll number with an identity card to confirm their enrollment in the college
- 2.1.2. Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other to various programmes of the Institution.

For Under Graduate and Post Graduate programmes

Subject to the eligibility prescribed by the Bharathiar University, candidates are admitted on a "first-come – first – served" basis.

For M. Phil. Research programme

The admission is made directly by the college as per the procedure prescribed by the University. Candidates directly apply to the college extending a copy of their application to the University also. The college can adapt any fair method for screening an applicant for M. Phil. After the admission is made by the college, the college notifies the University. The University sends the communication intimating the registration to the candidate through the Principal of the college extending a copy to the supervisor to whom the candidate has been allotted.

For direct admission to Ph.D. research programme

A candidate has to take a Common Entrance Test conducted by the University if he / she has not qualified for NET / SET examination. Candidates who have qualified for NET / SET will be treated on par with M. Phil degree holder for the purposes of admission to Ph.D. programme. The marks secured by the candidates in the common entrance examination will be communicated to the candidate by the University. The candidate will apply to the college for admission to Ph.D. with the mark obtained in the common entrance examination. The college will constitute an admission committee which will conduct an interview. The college will award marks to the candidate on the basis of marks he / she secured in the qualifying examination (50%), marks in the University entrance examination 35% and marks in the interview 15%. The aggregate of candidates mark will be the basis for admission to Ph.D.

For admission to Ph.D. research programme for candidates with M. Phil. degree

Candidates who have qualified for NET / SET will be treated on par with M. Phil degree holder for the purposes of admission to Ph.D. programme. The college will constitute an admission committee which will conduct an interview. The college will award marks to the candidate on the basis of marks he / she secured in the qualifying examination (50%), the marks in the interview 15%. The two together will be converted for 100. The aggregate of a candidate's mark will be the basis for admission to Ph.D. programme.

Criteria adopted for admission to UG and PG

The college adheres to the minimum percentage of marks prescribed by the Bharathiar University for various programmes and follows the norms and reservation policy formulated by the Government of Tamil Nadu.

Criteria adopted for admission to Research Programmes

The candidates for M.Phil programme are selected on the basis of marks scored in their Master's Degree programme as well as their performance in Common Entrance Test (CET) conducted by Bharathiar University. The candidates select a college of their choice and apply to the same. The selection is made on the basis of their performance in the test and interview.

The candidates for Ph. D programmes are selected on the basis of merit, interview performance and through a Common Entrance Test (CET) conducted by Bharathiar University. The candidates who cleared common eligibility tests conducted by state agencies such as SET and national agencies such as UGC-NET/CSIR-NET/GATE are exempted from CET for admission into Ph. D programmes.

Based on the selection list, all original documents are verified on the day of admission and candidates are admitted to the respective programmes offered by the institution.

2.1.3. Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The college adheres to the minimum percentage of marks prescribed by the Bharathiar University for various programmes.

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes. A separate admission committee is framed to review the students' admission process and the profile of the students annually.

- Admission committee comprising the Principal, the Vice Principal, Heads of the Department and the senior faculty members of the college review the admission process annually.
- After the admission process, the Heads of the Department and staff advisors collect the profiles of the admitted students. This helps in better understanding of the students to develop their skills.

SC/ST/OBC

- Reservation policies of the Government are implemented to ensure the equity and provision for SC/ST applicants. Seats are allotted to SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker section students with minimum pass marks.
- All possible efforts are made to get scholarships for them from various sources to ease their financial constraints.

Women

- The college is a co-educational Institution.
- Separate hostel facilities are available for women. Counseling is provided to the students on health related issues.
- The college provides transportation and prompt health care during emergencies.
- The Women's forum of the College conducts different activities for the development of women.

Different Categories of Persons with Disabilities

 As per the State Government policy, reservations and other facilities are provided to differently-abled the students. The requirements of the differently-abled students are given special attention and care by providing lift, rest room and ramping facilities.

Outstanding Achievers in Academics

Some students are intellectually gifted. The teachers identify such students in the classroom session. They are given extra learning materials and other required aids to excel in

their performance and are encouraged to take part in various inter and intra college competitions.

They are encouraged to undergo various placement oriented courses through open source learning programmes and through spoken tutorials sponsored through Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD). They are given awareness on global opportunities in higher education and research.

Outstanding Achievers in Sports and Extra-curricular activities

Excellent performers in sports and games, extra-curricular activities are given full concession in term fee, examination fee, bus fee, hostel establishment charges and mess fee on the recommendation of the coaches and physical directors. Travelling allowances are offered them to participate at National level events.

Economically weaker sections

- Fee concession, scholarships from private and government agencies and bank loans
 are arranged for poor students. Students of this section are allowed to pay the fees in
 installments without fine.
- Under the free education scheme of the affiliating university, the institution provides
 merit scholarship to the students on the basis of marks and admits students from
 economically backward sections, first time graduates, wards of widows, orphans and
 destitutes.

PG programmes than fluctuation in admission. Students prefer job after completing UG. It has been observed that the students from other Institutions take up their PG programme in this Institution after completing UG.

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The Institution fosters an inclusive academic ambience and caters to the specific needs of the differently abled students keeping in mind the Government regulations. The Institution has made arrangements for differently abled students in terms of physical facilities like ramp, rest room and elevator.

2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details of the process.

After the admission and before the commencement of the program, the knowledge and skill of the students is assessed by collecting information about the level of subject background, social economic background, their interest and priority in joining various clubs through a well structured questionnaire. The College organizes orientation /induction programme for the freshers.

Screening test with objective type questions in mathematics, basic sciences and language skills is conducted for the students. Based on the level of understanding in the subjects, bridge course is conducted to bridge the knowledge gap. The freshers are given awareness about the rules and regulations, facilities and programmes available in the campus.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The Institution adopts the following strategies to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students

- The College conducts bridge course after the initial assessment of the student's level in the stream concerned. Specialized modules are designed by experienced faculty.
- Exclusive coaching classes are designed and conducted for the advanced learners and slow learners according to their competency level.
- In addition to the prescribed syllabus of the University, value added courses are

- offered of the students by experienced professionals. Each value added course is taken care by a coordinator to assess the effect of the teaching-learning process.
- All the value added programs are planned to impart knowledge to the students according to placement needs.
- To cope up with the program of their choice, the Choice Based Credit System and the Non-Major Elective Course (NMEC) System are embedded in the curriculum.

The teaching-learning evaluation schedule is incorporated into the total scheme at the beginning of each academic year.

• A well defined academic calendar is prepared at the beginning of each academic year by the college in accordance with the norms of the University. It includes all the relevant information pertaining to the Institution. This hand book is distributed to the faculty and students and is uploaded in the official website of the college.

- The Academic Calendar, a part of the college hand book, is prepared with the directions of the Principal, the Vice- Principal and the Dean and circulated to the teachers and students at the beginning of the academic year. It includes the college vision, mission, faculty details, rules and regulation of the college, department association activities, dates of re-opening, internal and model examinations details, college club details, important functions of the college, Government, local and institutional holidays.
- The unitized teaching schedule, portions for mid and end semester examinations, assignments, seminar and details of teaching techniques adopted by the teachers are planned and presented as log book to the Principal at the commencement of every semester. The planned curriculum of the semester is displayed in the students' notice board.
- Changes in teaching, learning and evaluation is discussed in the HoD's meeting and Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) meetings to cater to with the needs of the students and parents in accordance with the Government Order through Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE). The results are communicated to the Governing Council and the Board of Management of the college. These bodies review the results, make suggestions and counsel lower performing faculty.

Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on Courses

- Students are admitted in the bridge courses to acquire basic knowledge in Accountancy, Mathematics, Computer Science and English.
- Based on the results of the end-semester examinations, the below average students are identified for remedial coaching. Remedial coaching is conducted after regular class hours. Peer teaching and learning are encouraged and practiced.
- Apart from the regular programmes, the college offers Value Added Courses to improve the employability skills of the students.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

 At the commencement of each semester, the Chairman and the Secretary of the college address the members of the faculty on the importance of handling the students with sensitivity and discipline.

- The class advisors are directed to handle and counsel sensitive issues relating to gender discrimination or caste.
- Privation of sexual harassment committee and women's forum sensitize young girls on issues such as self defense and pre marital counseling.
- Students are encouraged to take part in activities conducted by the Eco club to create awareness on green audit and energy conservation projects.
- The Center for Value Education organizes workshops and seminars to address the above issues.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- The continuous internal assessment system helps to identify advanced learners. They
 are encouraged to explore their knowledge to secure University ranks and medals.
 The Secretary Periodically interaction with such bright students by way of
 encouraging and improving them.
- Advanced learners are exposed to various e-learning resources and encouraged to present the review of research articles in every journal club meeting.
- They are supported by spoken tutorials of Indian Institute of Technology, Mumbai to complete the certificate courses for employment.
- An MoU is signed with Max Value Online Chennai to conduct innovative courses for who evince promise students.
- Participation and presentation of papers by UG and PG students in conferences and seminars provide a platform for interaction with peer groups.
- Publication of articles in National/ International Journal disseminates knowledge and inculcates involvement in research activities.
- Articles and books are reviewed through book review club (Youngistan club) and Journal club to develop critical evaluation and creative thinking.
- Competitions and cultural programmes are conducted by the departments and clubs to provide opportunities for the students to exhibit their talents.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to carry out projects sponsored by Tamil Nadu

State Council for Science and Technology. Students are involved in funded research projects sponsored by UGC, DST, DBT and ICSSR.

• University Rank holders are honoured with medals during the Graduation Day.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of dropout (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The Departments assess the academic performance of the students through continuous internal assessment system. The class advisors through the Department meetings allow the slow learners to express their difficulty in learning to HoD and subject teachers for remedial coaching. The parents are communicated when the students show disinterest. Counseling is given to students by the student counselor to reduce the dropout rate due to their inability to continue the studies.

The following steps are practiced to improve the learning skills of the students.

- Coaching is given to slow learners in remedial classes.
- The faculty supports the students by preparing teaching learning materials which include lecture notes and question bank.
- Special coaching is given to slow learners in the hostel premises.
- Students with health ailments avail fee concession at Kovai Medical Centre and Hospital, Coimbatore.
- Apart from fee concession, time extension is given to the economically weaker sections for the payment of fee.
- The parents are communicated on the performance of their wards.
- A professional counselor visits the campus twice in a week for counseling.
- The Tutors, Heads of the Departments and the Principal involve themselves in the professional development of the students by continuously addressing their requirements.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, Teaching plan, Evaluation blue print, etc.)

A comprehensive action plan is developed as under:

1. Academic Calendar

An academic calendar is prepared for the college with the details of semester time schedules for CIA test, period of evaluation, schedule of guest lectures, seminars, workshops, conferences, association activities and field visits.

2. Time Table

Heads of the Departments conduct department meetings for the distribution of the work schedule and the allotment of the subjects based on the expertise of the faculty members prior to the commencement of the semester. The time table is prepared by the departments concerned and approved by the Principal.

3. Teaching Plan/Lesson Plan

A log book is maintained by the faculty with the lesson plan for the stipulated working days. Each faculty records the contents delivered, number of hours handled and the teaching methodology used.

4. Assessment of Student Learning

Assessment is done based on the guidelines prescribed by the Bharathiar University for Continuous Internal Assessment. 25 marks are allotted for the major subjects as Internal Marks and 20 marks for allied subjects.

5. Academic Audit

Academic audit is conducted by external auditors to verify the academic accuracy and suggest corrective measures. The auditing process comprises the verification of answer booklets, laboratory log books, evaluation of assignments and feedbacks.

- The college provides opportunity for collaborative learning by encouraging group discussions and team projects designed to promote innovative thinking.
- The e-Learning activities in the campus provide the necessary support for student centric learning through online courses. Various teaching techniques like brain storming, symposium, simulation exercises encourage group learning attitude and

few programs like market expo, project works, internship programs and journal clubs builds team spirit among them.

Case studies, review of research articles, spoken tutorials of IIT Mumbai, NPTEL
resources ignite the minds and kindle the interest of students towards research and
independent thinking.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The Institution nurture critical thinking through discussion with peer group and interactions with eminent researchers by participating in technical symposium and by conducting intra and inter collegiate presentations and debates.
- Students are encouraged to participate in fest and competitions at national level and nurture the creative skills.
- Conduct scientific exhibitions, poster presentations, quiz programs, drama club activity and book review clubs stimulate critical thinking of the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Teaching learning is made effective by the use of power point presentations and other multimedia teaching aids. The resource center provides online journals DELNET/INFLIBNET and other Database Management systems to help the members of the staff and students in knowledge enhancement.

- The institution provides the staff and students with lab facilities to gain practical knowledge through open source learning like COURSERA, EDX, spoken tutorial of IIT and Max value online learning.
- NPTEL, Technology Channels and other oral/audio tutorial systems are used to share information among faculty and students.
- Wi-Fi facility is made available for faculty and students.
- Language laboratory has unique modules for effective communication.

- Faculty holding membership in professional bodies updates with reference to the ongoing trends in those bodies and takes steps to make it available to the students.
- Experts from professional agencies conduct value added courses.
- Internship programmes are arranged to enhance the employability skills of the students.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- The students and faculty are encouraged to take part in seminars, conferences and workshops organized by other agencies, institutions and Universities.
- The students are encouraged to read magazines, journals, data bases and present the research articles through the journal club in the department concerned.
- The research scholars are encouraged to interact with the students of UG and PG programmes to create research ambience. Special lectures are organized by inviting experts from various universities, industries and professional bodies for knowledge sharing.
- The institution sponsors faculty members for programmes organized by the leading companies like Infosys, Wipro, TCS and programmes organized by various bodies associated with the institution like CII, CMA and CPC.
- Students are introduced to the functional experts through the chapters like Computer Society of India and other networks directed by the departments.
- Lab facility is provided to obtain certificates by the staff and students through Max Value Online.
- Specialised courses are designed in the teaching learning process for developing analytical skills, electronic and keyboard skills, communication and writing skills.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/ benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advice) provided to students?

The class advisors and respective staff in- charges guide and counsel the students at the department level. The mentoring is done with the student teacher ratio 1:21.

It is sensitized to narrow down on students with disturbing emotional issues. However a

trained professional counselor Dr. S. Rajendran and Mrs. N. Mangaleshwari Manjari, from Kovai Medical Center and Hospital are available in the campus for two days in a week for counseling the students who have registered. The counselor sorts out and redresses the psychological issues of the students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/ methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The Institution motivates the faculty to adapt new and innovative approaches in teaching and learning process. The Institute organizes regular orientation programmes, skill upgradation programmes and programmes on Instructional design. Faculty members are deputed to attend faculty enrichment programmes conducted by various Universities.

Learning outcomes from the above assignments give impetus to the students to obtain university ranks, project awards and prizes. So far 258 ranks have been obtained by the students of the institution from the Bharathiar University.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- The library is equipped with 32000 books and 94000 E- Books and E- Journals. Students can borrow books through library cards. They can use the digital library consortium (N-LIST) and the internet available in the library.
- The reading habits are stimulated by making the students to read the articles/ books and review it through journal club.
- The back volumes of the projects along with selective projects are displayed in the library. In order to decentralize the knowledge sharing, department libraries are maintained.
- The vendors of the databases are invited periodically to give demos on retrieving the database.
- Librarian organizes book exhibitions to create awareness on the current publication of books.
- Librarian conducts orientation programs to staff and students highlighting the procedures and utilization of knowledge resources.
- Center for Research helps the students to review the research projects by displaying the compilation of the reports of the staff and students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes. The Institution faced such problem once due to some political reasons. But those days were compensated by extending the working days. The local festival holidays were compensated by working on Saturdays. Few application oriented subjects require additional hours for which a special schedule is maintained. Subjects like mathematics require more tutorial hours which was arranged for the students.

2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

- The quality of teaching learning is evaluated through log books by the head of the department and the Principal. The exclusive academic audit and other internal audits are done by the IQAC Cell.
- Feedback is obtained from the students at the end of each semester and deviations
 are made note in the feedback analysis and are strictly conveyed to the concerned
 faculty. The academic performance of the student is analyzed through a continuous
 assessment system.
- Students are monitored by the tutors and class advisors to identify slow learners and they are given additional support. Advanced learners are encouraged to pursue higher levels of knowledge. Apart from monthly department meetings, review meetings are conducted by the Management and the Principal.
- Students are encouraged to record their suggestions through suggestion boxes and can also meet the Principal regarding academic grievance on all the days after 4.30 P.M. A social audit is conducted among the stake holders to identify the performance gaps in the system.

2.4. TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum).

The Head of the Departments analyze the vacancy position in each semester and submit the requirement to the management through the Principal, following which advertisements are given in local and national papers. The screening committee of the Principal and Heads of department shortlist the candidates according to the requirement of the course and qualification eligibility. The selection committee consisting of the Chairman, the Secretary, the CEO, the Principal, the HoDs and the subject experts recruit the competent faculty. Provisions like empowerment programs, FDPs, leave on duty for seminars/ conferences, awards and appreciations are granted to encourage retention of competent faculty.

Training programmes on teaching methodologies and approaches are conducted by inviting experts in the field of education.

• Handling New Curriculum

The department recommends changes in the curriculum based on the contemporary needs to the Board of Studies of Bharathiar University for consideration.

• Content/Knowledge Management

The IQAC organises training programmes on Moodle Learning Management Software for the faculty members of the college. Center for Research organizes workshop on SPSS for research data analysis. Every year the faculty and the students are given awareness on the usage of e-resources from NLIST, subscribed e-journal and the Library's OPAC.

• Selection, Development and use of Enrichment Materials

The faculty members access to the materials of COURSERA, ALISON, OPEN 2 STUDY, BIG-DATA, CCNA, PHP MYSQL, UDEMY, Academicearth.org, OCWMIT and EMC²- Cloud Computing to enrich teaching learning process.

• Cross Cutting Issues

Faculty Development Programmes, workshops are organized to solve the cross cutting issues.

• Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

The members of faculty use Audio Visual Aids/Multimedia and Smart Class to enhance teaching learning process.

• Open Educational Resources (OER)

Training sessions are organized on the use of OERs such as Directory of Open Access Journals (DOAJ), Intranet communication and content management systems.

- Students' feedback on the effectiveness of teaching is obtained for all the subjects in each semester. The shortcomings are addressed by the Heads of the Department and the Principal.
- Members of faculty are recommended to observe and follow the best teaching
 practices of the senior faculty. By the end of each semester, all the faculty members of
 the institution present various teaching modules on current topics to highlight different
 dimensions of teaching
- A social audit is conducted among the stakeholders of the institutions to elicit opinion on the performance gaps in both academic and administrative practices.

2.5. EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1. How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The stakeholders of the institution i.e. students, faculty members and parents are informed about the evaluation process through the orientation programme conducted on the first day of the year.
- Communications from the affiliating university is circulated among the students and staff
 and displayed on notice boards. The changes introduced by the university with regard to
 examination and evaluation are intimated to the students and faculty.
- Exam cell of the institution in conformity with the university examination norms conducts internal assessment tests. The cell ensures the same through the setting up of internal question papers, submission of question paper, conduct of tests, and distribution of answer scripts and entry of marks.
- Students are informed about the question paper pattern, schemes of evaluation and the rules and regulations that govern the conduct of practical examinations.
- Model test is conducted before the university examinations. The details of the attendance

- and the marks secured by the students are communicated to the parents and counseling is given to the students in the presence of parents whenever necessary.
- Members of staff are impressed upon about the process and significance of quality evaluation in the department meetings.
- Parent teacher meet is conducted once in a semester to discuss students' issues regarding the academic procedures and development.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- University has introduced continuous internal assessment system for the benefit of the students which include evaluating assignments, three internal tests including model examination. The maximum weightage is given to external examinations conducted by the University. Students' projects are evaluated through viva-voce by the experts appointed by the University.
- The students are encouraged to take up internship training at different organizations to be
 evaluated during the practical examinations. The revaluation system is an opportunity for
 the students to recheck their performance in their examinations. A transparent system is
 followed as per the University examination norms.
- The Institution follows a standard system in the conduct of regular tests, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Rewards and recognitions are considered on the basis of presentations, quality debates, panel discussions and reviews on articles.
- Periodic academic audit is conducted to ascertain the effectiveness of teaching learning
 process of the members of faculty. The academic audit includes the checking of evaluated
 papers, laboratory records, project reports and marks awarded. The audit is done by
 external experts. IQAC Cell conducts periodical internal audit.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

- Students are permitted to know their internal marks within a week from the date of examination.
- Periodic examinations are conducted to fulfill the requirement of the University. The
 evaluation process is monitored by conducting meetings with the Principal and Heads

- of the Departments.
- Periodic Counseling is given to the students on examination and evaluation system.
 Model practical examinations are conducted before the University examinations.

 Counseling record of the students gives the academic progress reports through which outcomes of the improvements can be assessed. Students record their opinion on examination and evaluation system during meetings with the Principal, Heads of the Departments, Class Advisors and through suggestion box.
- Students' grievance redressal committee enables the students to record any grievance.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- The Institution adopts both formative and summative methods of evaluation to measure student achievements and bring about qualitative improvements in the teaching strategies deployed.
- The formative approach includes assignments, seminar presentations, unit tests, model examination, paper presentations, field visits, industrial visits, class interactions, group discussions, workshops, research activities, mini projects, organizing functions to develop managerial skills, participation in extension activities
- The summative approach is governed by the guidelines of university: it includes endsemester examinations, viva-voce on projects and practical examinations. The faculty identifies the slow learners and special attention is given to them through special coaching classes that are conducted after regular class hours. The theory class and lab session helps the faculty students in assessment at summative level.

2.5.5 Detail the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

• There is a complete transparency in the internal assessment as directed by the affiliating University. 25% of weightage is given to internal marks. The segregation is 5+5+10+5 for Internal I, Internal II, Model and assignment/ seminar respectively. The student can go through the internal/ model exam answer scripts and gets clarified.

This facilitates the faculty in assessing performance through different attributes. The
updates and outcomes are displayed in the notice boards and are communicated to
parents too periodically. The interaction between parents and teacher results in better
performance.

2.5.6 What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college en sure the attainment of these by the students?

- Graduate attributes specified by the affiliating university include the academic eligibilities such as attaining minimum marks in internal assessment and university examinations.
- Counseling records are maintained for each student with the details of the performance in the examinations, attendance, performance in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The Department assesses the students on these factors.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

A mechanism is followed for redressal of grievances relating to the evaluation systems of college and University.

- In case the question paper has questions out of syllabus, the subject in-charge makes
 note of it and deviations if any will be informed to the university through the exam
 cell. The same is communicated to the respective board for awarding bonus marks for
 the students.
- If in any case the students are not satisfied with the evaluation, they can apply for revaluation within the date mentioned by the University. Deviations in the internal marks published by the University are addressed by the Head of the Department and the Principal. The examination cell of the college handles such issues under the guidance of the Principal.

2.6. STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1. Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes. The college focuses on attaining academic excellence and enables the students to get through the university examinations. The institution works for 100% results and University ranks. It is a practice of the institution to give orientation to all the I Year students regarding career, academic and research opportunities.

Apart from the academic targets, well defined outcomes are incorporated to equip the learner to be skilled in the field of study concerned for employment. The Center for Value Education creates a sense of social responsibility to achieve learning outcomes. An extensive orientation is given to the students by the Management, the Principal, Heads of the Department and senior faculty during the induction program. Periodic reinforcement by the faculty guides the students to attain academic excellence.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/ achievements (Programme/ course wise for last four years) and explain the differences. if any, in patterns of achievement across the programmes/ courses offered.

The College monitors the progress of the students individually and as a group (Class / Discipline). Result analysis is discussed in the department meetings with members of staff, in HoD's meeting with the Principal and the Management. The reason for low performance is identified and action plan is executed by the tutors and respective staff by counseling, conducting remedial classes and slip tests to clear the examinations. Tutorial Record/Counseling Record is maintained by the class advisors to monitor their performance. Recognition through awards and rewards for better academic performance of the student and staff is a practice of the college for academic progress. Efforts are made to enhance the active participation of students in Continuous Internal Assessment since it has a relevance and correlation to end-semester results. Slow learners are given sustained attention and encouraged for better performance. Tutors monitor the class room performance and attendance. Frequent parent meeting and alumni meet are conducted to evaluate and enhance the quality of the teaching-learning process.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The faculty plans well- in-advance the lessons to be taught in accordance with the curriculum. This is recorded in the log book of individual faculty. The source of knowledge, mode of teaching and the time duration is well planned for the effective outcome of teaching. Care is taken to follow the lesson plan without any deviation. ICT adoption enhances learning compared to the chalk and talk method. Learning methods like independent learning, collaborative learning, project learning and ICT learning stimulate the learners through seminars, assignments and power point presentations. Slow and fast learners are categorized based on their performance in the school and college. Fast learners are fine tuned for academic excellence. Continuous internal assessment disciplines the learner to the intended outcome. Priority is given for Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) to improve the consistency in learning. Learning attributes are sown in the minds of learners and teachers for enhanced outcomes. Tutor-ward system of the college makes the learning environment exclusive, vibrant and challenging. Prioritizing learning skills are vital in student centered education process.

2.6.4 What are the measures/ initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.,) of the courses offered?

Students are placed in reputed organizations and trained to become entrepreneurs.

Placement cell and entrepreneur development cell are geared to ensure economic relevance of education. Key inputs are given to the students to strengthen their innovative ideas and gain thereby social recognition.

Extension activities through NSS, YRC and RRC are promoting the strength of unity and coordination among students and increase the team spirit. IQAC encourages the post graduates and research scholars to publish research papers in global research forums. An IAS Training Academy has established in the campus to train the students for competitive examinations.

The Institution conducts mock exams for IBPS, UGC- NET and CSIR with the support of Max Value Learning to train the students to face these board exams.

Value added programs are conducted for second and final year students to give an edge over other students in placement. Off campus and on campus interviews are arranged by placement division with the intention to place maximum number of students. The institution took steps for autonomous status to have academic flexibility, to incorporate new segments in the existing curriculum and to fill the gap between academic and industry.

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The college conducts Continuous Internal Assessment I examinations on 25th working day. The answer sheets are evaluated and analysis is made to monitor the performance of the students in the learning process. The CIA I assessment covers 2 units, CIA II covers 4 units and the model examinations covers the entire syllabus. This method helps the students in better learning. The poor performers are identified, counseled and extra coaching classes are arranged.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?


In between two continuous assessment examinations, a class committee meeting is conducted. The students are selected based on their performance as advanced learners and slow learners. A senior Professor and HoD from other departments interact with the students about the syllabus coverage, class tests, submission of assignments and seminars. The report is submitted for perusal of the Principal.

Yes. The minutes of the meeting is submitted to the Principal. Any short fall in the outcome noted and counseled by the Principal, He suggests steps to overcome the same. Faculty lesson planning and course planning are closely monitored for Teaching, Learning and Evaluation.

This centre is utilized by the students, research scholars and faculty of Biochemistry, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Foods and Nutrition and science departments. In addition, the institution has established a Centre for Research and research activities are organized and conducted in the campus.

Yes. The college has a Centre for Research. The coordinator is supported by faculty engaged in research. Senior faculty suggest and advice the committee's role for proper implementation of the various activities.

The major functions of the research committee are as follows:

- Creates awareness among the faculty about the funding agencies and for resource mobilization
- Orientation to research scholars on research design
- Encourages the students to carry out projects in thrust areas
- Motivates the faculty to publish articles in journals, participate and present papers in conferences / seminars / symposia and to apply for research grants to funding bodies.
- Conducts workshops on research methodology and tools like SPSS, CFD and MATLAB.
- The implementation of the recommendations enhances the knowledge of the scholars on research tools and it also helps them to select the appropriate tool for their study.
- Encourages the students on survey projects.
- The suggestions given by the committee are shared among the scholars who attend conferences/ seminars and symposia outside the campus. The knowledge sharing session helps the scholars to understand the type of ongoing research in different universities and enables them to develop network with the experts.

 Workshop for faculty on writing of project proposal was organized upon the recommendation of the committee and 56 Minor project proposals have been submitted to the UGC in 2015-2016.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes / projects?

- The Principal Investigators are authorised to manage the funds granted by the funding agencies to carry out research activity. The institution monitors the proper utilization of the funds.
- Depending on the nature of requirements, advance funds are released to the Principal Investigator to procure chemicals or any other items necessary for research activity without delay.
- In case of delay in receiving the financial support from the funding agency, after sanctioning, the management provides seed money and advances to carry out the research activity without any delay.
- The institution provides necessary infrastructures such as lab facilities, internet facilities and systems as a supportive measure for the Principal Investigator.
- The institution maintains a separate account for each project and it is being audited by certified auditors to ensure transparency and proper utilization of the funds.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- The journal club of the college conducts article review by third UG students, I & II year PG students on every Wednesday. Students select research articles published in journals and present it in the department level gathering.
- Students are motivated to carry out survey research under the guidance of faculty.
- Students are encouraged by way of research awards instituted by the management.
- Workshops on research methodology
- Review meetings for research scholars are conducted two months once to monitor the progress of their research.

 - Every faculty member guides student project work: project is prescribed even for UG courses.
 - 69 members of the faculty are recognized by the Bharathiar University as research guides for M. Phil and 17 members as research supervisors for Ph.D.
 - The supervisors are currently guiding 52 Ph. D research scholars comprising 40 Full-Time and 12 Part-Time and 59 M. Phil research scholars.
 - 22 candidates have been awarded Ph. D degree by the Bharathiar University during the last four years.

 - The Centre for Research inculcates research culture among the staff and students

 - Need analysis/survey during NSS rural live in camps are conducted

3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

• If the consultancy work involves any facility to be utilized from the college by way of Laboratory, workshop and so on 40% of the consultancy fee is paid to the college towards

the expenditure for chemicals and all the other expenditures incurred is deducted as actual from the total fee received. The remaining amount is distributed between the college and the consultant concerned in the ratio of 60:40. If the consultancy work does not involve any facility from the college by way of laboratory, workshop and so on, the fee received is distributed between the college and the consultant concerned in the ratio of 60:40 after deduction of expenditures.



Figure shows the Building plan and location of various blocks for reference



4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?


The accuracy of calibration in precision measures for the instruments is ascertained every year with special technicians.



The institution has a Grievances and Redressal Cell coordinated by a senior faculty and assisted by select faculty members.

The students can communicate their grievances by using the following methods.



6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

Vision:

- To instill character in the mind of the students by providing value based education
- To manifest the perfection already in them.
- To enable them to excel by providing Quality Higher Education and Research opportunities on par with International Standards.

Mission:

- To provide Quality Education, Training and Research facilities to the students of our Nation and the world.
- To inculcate ethical, moral and social values in the minds of educators and students.
- To motivate and nurture co-operation, tolerance and mutual respect in our nation of diversity.

The institution gives priority for first generation graduates and students from rural background. The students are motivated through various forums to reach their goals. Outreach programmes are organized to enhance the quality of education. The students are motivated to get updated information with hands on training. Project work is considered as one of the priority areas to motivate and orient the students towards research activities. The Principal and the senior faculty of the Institution meet the students periodically to educate the moral on values. The activities carried out in the Institution are used to fulfill the vision and mission of the Institution.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and Implementation of its quality policy and plans?

• The quality policy and plans of the college are designed and implemented by the management, the college committee, the Principal and the members of the faculty.

The quality policy of the institution is commitment to providing quality education on par with global standards by continually improving the infrastructure and instructional facilities and offering market-oriented competency based updated curriculum to match the industrial expectations.

- The college governing council takes care of all the policy decisions pertaining to staff and resource requirements and finance. The finance controller along with the college committee takes care of financial matters like budget preparation, allocation to new building facilities and upgrading infrastructure. It renews the functional aspects for further achievement of the college every year by updating infrastructure facilities. It also reviews the academic attainment of the students with required skill plans.
- The Secretary implements all the policy decisions of the college through the Principal to execute. Once in every semester, the college committee meets and discusses the stages of improvement of quality policies and procedures and helps to fill up the performance gaps, if any. Quality Sign Boards are displayed at important places of the campus and the quality parameters are propagated to the stakeholders.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

• The policy statements and action plan for fulfillment of the stated mission.

The institution reviews the mission through academic committees. The academic committees meet periodically and discuss the various plans, procedures for the implementation of the policy to ensure fulfillment of mission. An action plan is prepared every semester and submitted to the Principal by every head of the department for approval and implementation.

Formulation of Action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan.

Under the guidelines of Bharathiar University and UGC, action plan is formulated for all operations through Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) by constituting committees and making follow-ups through department meetings. The same is incorporated in the institutional strategic plan and continuous improvement is done based on the feedback of faculty, students, secretary-students, parents and social audit.

Interaction with stakeholders

The Institution interacts with students, members of the student council, parents, alumni and members of faculty.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultation with the stake holders

Social audit helps to analyze the needs of the students, parents and society. The institution frames policies based on the regulations of UGC. Members of faculty attend seminars and workshops held at the state and national levels and present papers. During their interactions, stake holders discuss the current updates for policy making and implementation.

• Reinforcing culture of excellence

Individual reading habits and group sharing among the students add quality dimensions to Teaching-Learning. Culture-building is one of the important aspects of the institution. Encouraging the students to enroll in Diploma programmes, e-learning programmes, open source learning, BEC courses for developing communication skills, participation in co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and Journal Clubs reinforce the culture of excellence.

• Championing organizational change

Bench marking across the institutions helps for institutional change. The changes for improvement are identified through secretary-students, student council meet, Parent-Teacher Association meetings, Alumni Meet, Department meetings and through interorganizational sharing.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- The student representatives of the classes meet the Head of the Department periodically.
- The meeting of the heads of the department with the Principal is organized.
- Interaction of all coordinators of various committees is conducted regularly.
- Regular interaction and feedback from Parents are taken in to consideration.

Through the above mentioned ways, Effective and proper implementation of Institutional policy is obtained. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) reviews the functioning of the institution and suggests measures for improvement. The college committee monitors the progress works pertaining to academics and related activities and is discussed in the meeting about the functional plans of the different Cells.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top Management

The top management and the Principal of the college plan and execute academic programmes to achieve desired results through the heads of the department and members of the faculty. The heads of the department are given academic freedom to discuss with the members of the faculty in the department meeting and to communicate the same to the Principal for the professional development and institutional growth.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

- At student level: Associations, students' council, class representatives meet, giving opportunity to speak in Friday Assembly, club activities, NGP Fest, organizing intercollegiate competitions, presentation in conference and seminar and through the conduct of community oriented activities NSS, NCC and YRC.
- At Faculty level: Coordinating college committees, organizing conferences, seminars, workshops, organizing community oriented programmes, special lectures, IQAC activities and funded projects.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The academic tasks, assignment of workload and purchase of requirements of department and formulating new initiatives are done at the department level. Each department plans and organizes the academic activities related to its subject. They are given freedom to frame timetable for practical, invite guest speakers, accompanying students for field trips and other events outside the college. The departments are given autonomy to decide students' eligibility for appearing for examinations.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes. The systems are designed to encourage participation to optimize the good suggestions and talents from the Institution.

• At Student Level:

Students are encouraged to discuss at student council representative forums and secretary-students meets. The feedback systems relating to students are encouraged to receive maximum number of suggestions and grievance. Associations, various club activities and inter- department cultural activities (NGP FEST) are a few important platforms where students participate and showcase their talents. Participation and presentation in conferences, seminars and inter collegiate competitions are encouraged. Students are permitted to conduct community oriented activities in NSS, YRC and so on.

• At Faculty Level:

Members of the faculty are allowed to participate in various committee organizations, faculty meetings and other important decision making forums including college governing committee. They actively take part in admission, accreditation and review committees of the institution.

• At Management Level:

Members of Management are actively involved in forums like Governing Council, IQAC forums, Parent-Teacher Meet, Faculty meetings and review committee meetings. The inputs from parents, alumni and students are forwarded to the management for facilitating decision making.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Well defined quality policy statements are framed and displayed at important places of the institution in order to propagate the quality components at all levels. 

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The flow chart of organizational structure and decision making process is shown below



- The governing council members inclusive of the Chairman and the Secretary take policy decisions regarding various academic and administrative affairs of the institution. The Principal suggests and recommends to top management regarding the progression of staff and student. The Chief Executive Officer is in-charge of the overall administration of the college, supported by the other administrative staff.
- The Dean of Academic Affairs is in-charge of all academic tasks and curriculum translation. He coordinates with all the departments relating to teaching learning process and curriculum enrichment. Based on the suggestions, the learning and teaching practices are adopted as per the requirements.
- The Director in-charge of particular discipline monitors the implementation of the suggestions given by the management and department heads concerned. The Directors take care of the Faculty Development Programmes and the other initiatives to be included in extension and skill development. Managing Alumni Associations and Parent Teachers Association is planned by the Directors.
- HoDs are in charge of academic and administrative practices of the in departments. HoDs supervise the syllabus coverage by the faculty, curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular components. They represent to the Director and the Dean on the essential factors to be monitored for the overall improvement of the department. They take care of various clubs related to functional areas and the implementation of value added courses and support the placement related activities and co-ordinate with the placement cell.
- Staff members handle the allotted classes, counsel the students and take care of the slow learners and high potential learners of the classes.
- Counseling the students is one of the important tasks of the class advisors. They maintain log book and other documentation work relating to teaching learning and extension.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following

Teaching and Learning:

- The effectiveness of teaching and learning starts from the recruitment of quality teachers. Different teaching techniques and methodologies are followed in the institution to cater to all the learning styles of the students.
- Students are encouraged to access open source learning and advanced spoken tutorials
 of other institutions. The institution conducts FDPs and provides fund to organize
 invited lectures, workshops, seminars and conferences.
- The academic performance of the students is measured through continuous assessment tests and a few other methods like assignments and paper presentations. Slow learners are identified in the initial stage and remedial action is taken by conducting extra classes. The Industrial visits, digital learning technologies, communication labs, library facilities, evaluation systems, remedial classes, feedback mechanism contribute to the improvement of quality.
- Value Added Programs are offered to the students according to their branch of study.

Research and Development:

The Center for Research in the college promotes research activities among the staff and students. A committee is constituted to execute the action plans of the research departments. Functions of the center include encouragement of publications in various journals, survey research, workshop on research tools, developing laboratory practices and encouraging research funding through various funding bodies, FDPs and permitting faculty to prepare workbooks and case banks.

Community Engagement

Students are impressed upon about their role in the development of community. Extension activity is one of the major activities in the departments. The college encourages many activities of NSS, RRC and YRC. Other activities include blood donation camp, medical check-up facility, first aid programme, eye camp are conducted. The institution is particular to propagate the first aid awareness programs through professionally trained agencies. Students are involved in a few Central Government Programs like Swachh Bharat by carrying out the activities in nearby

villages. Organizations like Rotary are solicited for health and educational awareness programs and in donating saplings to nearby villages.

Human Resource Management:

The college follows the process of engaging adequate human resource to attain institutional objectives. The college takes care of the staff by providing welfare schemes which include medical leave, insurance benefits, special On-Duty for attending conferences and financial incentives for publications and research efforts.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.,) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

- The Head of the Institution obtains adequate information through student forums, alumni association, HoDs and parent-teacher association meetings.
- Regular feedback system has been designed to conduct social audit among all the stakeholders of the institution through a well designed comprehensive questionnaire.
- Hostel meetings are conducted for boys and girls to get feedback.
- For outgoing students, exit feedback is collected to bridge the performance gap.
 Review meetings for placement, value added programs are conducted. The
 information collected through counseling, evaluation and student forums are
 conveyed to the management. Information is passed on to stake holders through
 college website, circulars and notice boards.
- The Secretary of the Institution visits the Students of the Institution, members of the faculty, Heads of the Departments regularly.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The Management encourages and supports involvement of staff in FDPs and Communication training programs. Permission is granted to conduct conferences, seminars, workshop and other academic sessions. Awards are given to the faculty for the achievements.

- Faculty members are retained in the institution through performance counseling by the Principal to sustain assured quality of teaching.
- The senior faculty and former Principals of various Institutions are appointed as members of guest / visiting faculty to share their knowledge and experience.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

Financial management is taken care by financial section under a Finance Controller, Accounts Manager and a team of Accounts Staff. Budget proposals are made and submitted by the departments every year before the commencement of academic sessions. The top management reviews the proposals and approves them. Expenditure, salary, operational costs, construction and reserves are managed through budgetary control by the management.

A statutory audit is conducted at the end of every financial year. Internal Audit is done by certified auditors. The last audit was carried out in the year 2014-2015.

- verification of answer script, laboratory log book, and record note books of the students. The audit includes the feedback of the students on teaching learning process.
- The class advisor-ward meetings are conducted by the Class Advisor who reviews the students' performance in the classes and examinations along with counseling details and areas to be improved by the student.
- The IQAC meets every month to plan and execute the academic and administrative activities to its members.
- Preparation of course plan at the beginning of academic year and updating work diary in commensuration with the course plan.
- Guides to adopt teaching-learning methods.
- Incorporation of practical component, field visit, internships and other experiential learning methods those are relevant in respective discipline.
- Teachers' council supports IQAC to review and monitor the efficiency of teaching learning process.

- The litter from the trees are collected and allowed to decompose without being burned. The decomposed organic waste is used for the plants as fertilizers.
- The movement of vehicle into the campus is restricted from the entrance.

 The parking is allowed to reduce the vehicle emission from the vehicles and helps to keep the campus free the dangers of pollution.

Plantation:

- The Eco club and NSS organize programmes on tree plantation, maintenance and distribution of saplings in and outside the campus.
- The institution maintains herbal gardens with more than 30 varieties of medical plants. The green house in the campus is well maintained and rare varieties of plantation.





POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The IQAC of the institution has been instrumental in the introduction and implementation of innovative measures and institutionalization of best practices in the college for the quality initiation, enhancement and sustenance. The post-accreditation initiatives taken by the College for quality development, enhancement and sustenance are as follows:

New Academic Programmes: The College introduced new academic programmes to meet the student and societal demands and in terms of employability. At Under Graduate level B.A. English Literature (CA), B.Com (IT), B.Com (PA), B.Com Finance, B.Com Banking and Insurance, B. Sc Physics, and B. Sc Mathematics have been introduced. The Peer Committee of the Autonomous visited our Institution during November 7th and 8th 2014 and the Institution has been granted autonomy since the academic year 2015-2016.

Communicative Skills: The Department of English provides communicative classes for the students to channelize their communicative skills. The department offers various courses to sharpen the students' communicative skills. The courses VAC, UGC- COC, BEC pave way for the students to widen their perspectives in language learning. The courses mould the students to enhance the Grammatical Structures, LSRW skills and the VAC classes converge the language learning through activity oriented classes. The department encourages the students to take part in various clubs, in which they learn quizzing skills, reading oriented sessions; activities for vernacular medium students and to show case the talent of them to bring out their enacting ability.

Language Lab: The College has a Language lab to promote the international pattern of speaking in English. Through this lab the student learn advanced levels of English – Listening, Pronunciation, Grammar, Soft Skills, Comprehension, Inter Cultural behaviors, Reading Skills, Videos and Speaking test, Academic study skills and business writing. Through this communicative class, the students overcome their inhibitions of speaking a foreign tongue.

Dr. NGP IAS Academy was initiated to mould and channelize the civil service aspirants of our college. The Academy is an exclusive training institution for the Civil Services Examination conducted by the Union Public Service Commission. The academy support the students by providing them special coaching to compete and come out successfully in the examinations conducted by the Union Public Service Commission and State Service Commission. The academy has an exclusive library with study materials that is required to gear up to excel in the competitive examinations.

ICTACT & Entrepreneurship Development Cell

ICTACT & EDC was started during 2014 and the main purpose of the cell is to develop individuals across socio economic backgrounds with the courage to dream, the drive to make a difference, the ability in themselves and the perseverance to convert their thoughts into action. The cell plans to prepare a pool of next generation entrepreneurs to the economic and social development of our mother nation. Prosperity of a nation and society is measured by the entrepreneurial spirit of its people.

Entrepreneurship is an essential constituent of industrialization and economic development. Entrepreneurs are anticipated to play vital role in the process of expansion by introducing innovations and demonstrating leadership qualities in the dynamic situation. Educating and training people for developing industrial capabilities through positive training involvement will be the core strategy of the Entrepreneurship Development Cell. In the history of Bharathiar University this is the First Gold Medal in Decathlon secured by our student and S. Padmavathi of I MIB bagged Bronze Medal in Steeple Chase.

Cultural activities: The college mission is to provide a balanced all round education. Keeping this in mind the students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities through cells and associations. The students participated in various state and national level events and have excelled and won many awards.

Library The institution has a library with reprographic and computer facilities. Considering a wide range of courses offered by the institution, library facilities have been improved. Central library has been automated. Beside holding an excellent print collection of over 26,528 volumes of books, more than 3000 Back volumes and 200 journals, theses, reports, it also provides access to over 93,800 electronic books, 2500 E - Journals and databases in Biosciences, Computer technology, social sciences and management.

Central Library has its own homepage (www.drngpasclibrary.pbworks.com), provides web-based access to its resources, procures over 80,000 electronic Books and 2500 E - Journals and databases, supports on-line submission of theses and dissertations, and has set up an institutional repository of publications brought out by the Faculty community. The library maintains excellent relations with UGC InfoNet - Digital Library Consortium (N-LIST) to enable the staff and student community to use ILL services to obtain articles not owned by the central library. The college has recently installed CMIE Database Prowess for the benefit of research students.

Extension Programmes: The College is linked to the community through its various activities and programmes carried out by the NSS and Cells, namely adoption of a village, conducting medical camps, organizing rallies for various causes. Blood donation camps are also undertaken.

NSS: Student participation in NSS has shown a spectacular growth during post accreditation period. Professional Courses: The escalating demand for commerce programmes and lure of Chartered Accountants and Company Secretaries prompted the College to offer professional courses. The college has initiated professional courses namely ACS Foundation Programme of The Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI), New Delhi to conduct ACS Foundation Programme for the benefit of the students to join professional courses. A large number of students have enrolled in the ACS Foundation programme and are pursuing their Company Secretaryship Course. Chartered Accountancy – Common Proficiency Course (CPC) is also initiated for all commerce students to pursue their career in Chartered Accountancy.

Recommendations for Quality Enhancement of the Institution

The peer team which assessed and accredited our College in 2010 made the following recommendations. Given below are the measures initiated by the college to implement them.

***** The College may try to introduce communicative English for all students particularly for those who have studied in the Vernacular medium.

The Department of English provides communicative classes for the students to channelize their communicative skills. Special attentions are given in order to cater to the needs of the vernacular medium students. The department has undertaken various courses and activities with an intention to sharpen the student's communicative skills effectively.

The Value Added Courses like UGC- COC and the training given by the Voice Training Solutions makes the students competent enough to enter into a corporate sector. BEC moulds the students in LSRW skills. The UGC sponsored Career Oriented Communicative English course was introduced to facilitate the students to understand the vocabulary and grammatical structures of the English language. At the end of the 3rd year programme, the students receive a Certificate, a Diploma and an Advanced Diploma in Communicative English awarded by the Bharathiar University.

The Value-added Programme, **Business English** (BEC) is offered to the interested students of all disciplines. It was introduced from the academic year 2012-13 as per the norms of the British Council with the syllabus framed by the Cambridge University, England. Another Value -added Programme from the **Voice Training Solutions** is offered to II B.A English Literature (CA) Students. This training was also extended to the students of other disciplines from January 2015 onwards.

The Department of English with the sponsorship of the Management established an English Language Lab during the academic year 2009-10, which serves as an essential component for all the students in achieving English proficiency. The Software installed in the lab is **CLARITY INFINITY**. The lab enables 60 students to work simultaneously. It offers Listening, Pronunciation, Grammar (from Elementary to Advanced level) Soft Skills, Comprehension, Inter- Cultural behaviour, Reading Skills, Vocabulary, Authentic Reading Texts, Videos of the speaking test, Timed-listening tests, Exam tips, Academic Study Skills, Tense busters and Business writings.

The 60-60 Communication programme is conducted exclusively with the objective of perfecting the Communicative skills of the vernacular medium students. Further the club acts as a bridge to build up the confidence level of the vernacular medium students. The programme includes sessions and activities like Story building, Oratorical speech, Master of the Ceremony, Group Discussion and Mock Interview etc.60 girls and 60 boys across different majors undergo training given by dedicated teachers and they are benefited by this programme. This club was successfully initiated in the academic year 2011-12.

Bridge course and orientation programmes are conducted every year to all the first year students during the first week of the student's entry into college. Bridge course removes the obstacles of the students in language acquisition.

The Youngistan Club alias Reader's Club's rationale is to create awareness about current issues and provides a platform for the students in book reviews. It aims at nurturing critical thinking in young minds and at enhancing the communication skills with a special focus on reading and speaking skills. Every year at least 50 members take part vigorously in the various sessions of the club. The club members are also sent to take part in various competitions conducted by other organizations.

Poor communicators of all the disciplines are given special attention through **Communication Mentoring Classes** for employability. Teachers were assigned with a minimum of ten students who lack in their communication. Regular communication activities were given to them during the sixth hour.

A **Workbook** has been designed by the department of English to enrich the **Grammatical Skills** of the first year students of all disciplines. It acts as a tool to the students to know about the nuances in the English language. The work book is designed concentrating on the written/comprehensive skills along with the notion of training the grammatical skills of the students. Besides developing LSRW skills, the Language Lab proves to be an effective place for the students to sharpen their grammatical and communication skills.

The journal club is conducted on every Wednesday in order to make the students to read and review the reputed journals and articles to enhance their communication skills.

❖ All departments may publish newsletter and wall magazines with academic articles contributed mainly by students.

The Departments publishes news letter every year with academic articles contributed by the students. These news letters are designed to keep informed on the latest developments. It is a platform for exchange and sharing of ideas, updates, latest developments in their respective field. In addition to this faculty and students also contribute to the college magazine regularly.

College may create posts of Professors in all Post Graduate Departments.

The College has created the post of Professors in majority of Post Graduate Courses and the faculties were designated accordingly taking in to account their experience, qualification etc.

❖ All faculty members may be encouraged to obtain Ph.D.

During the last accreditation, the college had only 34 members with Ph.D. qualification. At present 51 members of faculty have Ph.D. and 155 members of faculty have M. Phil. 76 Faculty members are pursuing their doctoral work on part – time basis. 27 members of faculty have cleared NET/SLET eligibility examination.

College may organize FDP in collaboration with other local institutions to orient teachers in learner – centered methods of teaching learning.

The college has paid much attention to the improvement of the academic enrichment of the faculty. Periodic need based faculty Development Programmes on the emerging knowledge domains and on topics like Teaching Methodologies, Academic planning, effective class room management, communication Skills, Evaluation Techniques, use of ICT and other similar programmes were organized. All these were done as a regular feature to sustain academic excellence of the faculty and to enhance the various quality dimensions of the college. Renowned resource persons are invited from multi-disciplinary fields in collaboration with local institutions to orient teachers in learner – centered methods of teaching learning.

The College may organize special coaching for Competitive exams.

Dr. NGP IAS Academy was inaugurated in the year 2013 to mould and channelize the civil service aspirants of our college. The Academy is an exclusive training institution for the Civil Services Examination conducted by the Union Public Service Commission. The academy support the students by providing them special coaching to compete and come out successfully in the examinations conducted by the Union Public Service Commission, TNPSC, Banking and other competitive examinations.

Presently 145 students have registered in Civil Service examination coaching class. 266 students have registered in TNPSC group IV examination.

❖ The College may make special arrangements for differently – abled students like ramps, special toilet facilities etc.

Based on the recommendations of the peer team, the College has provided ramps in all the buildings in order to facilitate easy transit and special toilet facilities for the differently abled person.

❖ The college has been recognized by UGC for starting vocational courses under Deen Dayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra Scheme.








Annexure- III NAAC-Quality Profile





- 3. The College shall have autonomy in the matter of
 - Framing the syllabus, course contents, adopting the University general
 pattern. The course contents and pattern should not be framed in
 such a manner as to render any of the staff surplus and to be
 redeployed.
 - ii. Arranging for instructions to students.
 - Devising methods of evaluation, examination and tests pertaining to the award of the degree / diploma by the University and
 - iv. Admission of students in respect of courses of studies for which "autonomy" is granted
- 4. The College shall have power to make rules or bye-laws consistent with the Bharathiar University Act 1981 and laws framed thereunder, for purpose of securing the objectives for conferring the Status of Autonomy to the College.
- The College shall set up statutory body to ensure proper management of academic, financial and general administrative affairs,
 - a. Governing Body*
 - b. Boards of Studies
 - c. Academic Council
 - d. Finance Committee
 - (The Governing Body is different from trust board / board of Management / Executive Committee / Management Committee)

and non-statutory bodies as given in the revised XI plan revised guidelines issued by the University Grant Commission.

The college shall send the Agenda papers for the meeting of the Board of Studies and Academic council to the University and the members concerned at least two weeks prior to the meeting and the minutes of the meeting within 30 days from the date of the meeting.

The constitution and the powers of the bodies said in para (5) above will be as per the XI plan revised guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission from time to time and any other guidelines issued by the University.

7. Results Passing Board.

There shall be a separate result passing board for each department. The result passing board shall consists of

- a. The Principal Chairman
- b. The University Nominee
- c. The Head of the concerned departments
- d. The Controller of Examinations of the College.
- There shall be a full-time Controller of Examinations not below the rank of Associate Professor be appointed.
- The decisions of the Academic Council on Academic matters shall generally be implemented by the Governing Body of the College.
- 10. Admission of students to courses of studies by the Autonomous College shall confirm to the minimum qualifications laid by the University for the courses of study concerned, subject to the rules of reservation for candidates belonging to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes, most backward and backward classes as laid down by the Government from time to time.
- 11. The University shall have the power to confer degrees, titles and diplomas on persons who have pursued approved courses of study in an autonomous college and have passed the examinations conducted by the college. The name of the autonomous college shall be indicated in the Diploma issued to the candidates.
- 12. The College shall apply to the University for affiliation to any under graduate and / or post - graduate courses and the new courses shall be offered only after grant of affiliation by the University.
- 13. The College shall maintain good academic standards and shall not allow deterioration of standards in the under-graduate and post graduate courses.
- 14. It shall be competent for the Synficate to extend the period of autonomy beyond five years on application made by the College.
- 15. The Syndicate shall have the power to revoke the Autonomy conferred at any time after scrutiny and after giving due notice of such intention to the College concerned before the expiry of the period mentioned in 1 supra in the case of deteriorating standards or for any other good cause.

.. 4 ..

16. Not-withstanding this conferment of Autonomous Status, all provisions of the Act, the Statutes, the ordinances and the Regulations of the University shall be applicable to the College except those relating to matters specified in these terms and conditions. The University shall continue to exercise its general power of supervision over the College.

The Status of Autonomous conferred now is subject to the acceptance of the prescribed conditions <u>supra</u> and such other conditions as may be prescribed by the Syndicate from time to time and prescribed in the XI plan revised guidelines of UGC for all other academic matters.

However, alignment of the skill components of the curriculum with the National Occupation Standards developed by the respective Sector Skill Councils will be ensured, and (vi) monitoring/evaluation and updating of the curriculum will be done periodically in consultation with the concerned Sector Skill Council and the industry partner keeping in view their requirements and changes in the National Occupation Standards.
