Eligibility

Candidates for admission to the first year of the Master of Social Work full time degree course shall be required to possess a pass in "Bachelor's Degree" of any University and as per the norms set by the Government of Tamil Nadu or an Examination accepted as equivalent hereto by the Academic Council, subject to such conditions as may be described there to are permitted to appear and qualify for the MSW Post Graduate Degree Examination of this College after a course of study of two academic years.

Concurrent Field Work – I

Field Work practicum is a learning opportunity designed to provide a variety of opportunities to develop and enhance professional Social Work skills. Learning is aided through Observations, Analysis of Social Realities and Experience of Participating in Designing and Implementation of Social Work Intervention.

Objectives of Concurrent Field Work - I

1. Develop knowledge of the Socio-Economic and Cultural Realities, and their impact on the Social/Client system with specific focus on marginalized groups.
2. Develop basic skills to analyze the impact of the wider social system on individuals, families, groups, communities and organizations.
3. Develop skills in documenting.
4. Develop ability to work as a member of a team.
5. Make conscious use of Professional Values and Ethics.
6. Develop Critical understanding of the application of Social Legislation, Legal Process and Social Policy
7. Develop the capacity to integrate knowledge and practice-theory by participating in Intervention.

Mandatory Field Orientation

In the first semester social work students will be given an opportunity to visit different Industries, hospitals, and NGO's in order to orient about its nature vision, functions. Through this orientation visit students will have a knowledge on different organizations in and around Coimbatore. Students will be able to relate the need and importance of social work profession in the organizations which are mainly concern for the needy people in our society It will widen their awareness on scope of social work in different settings.

Students can able to find out their interest area of specialization since they were observing various activities through this orientation visit. Students will also improve their writing skills by preparing reports for every visit they do in their field work. This will increase their confidence level when they prepare themselves and present it in the VIVA VOCE examination.

Observation Visits:

- For the I M.S.W. (semester I) 15 agency visits related to all the fields of social work will be conducted.
- Soon after the beginning of orientation/observation visits, a student workshop on - Field Work Practice and Training for social workers" will be conducted to orient and share the



orientation visit experiences and learning.

- Social Work related agency exposures will be arranged for the I MSW students. The various Agencies functioning will be explained to the students. The scope and Role of Social Workers will be highlighted.
- Students should submit observation visit report to the concerned faculty supervisor.


Group Project:
